Reading Group Questions

1. Kim, the protagonist of *The Narrow Bed*, is dryly sarcastic, and struggles to engage emotionally with her family, husband and lover. Is she a likeable character?
2. What effect does it have on the novel that Kim a stand-up comedian?
3. Sophie Hannah has said that her experiences on social media informed parts of *The Narrow Bed*. What do you think this novel has to say about social media and communication in a technological age?
4. 'Books are everywhere in this investigation,' says Charlie Zailer. The killer gives mysterious, hand-made books to the victims, and sends journalist Sondra Halliday books and short stories to read. What do you think is being said in *The Narrow Bed* about reading and how it shapes our world views?
5. How are ideology, obsession, and extreme opinions presented?
6. The key to catching a serial killer is understanding his or her pattern. Why do different characters see different patterns in this case? What other patterns are there in the book?
7. Simon Waterhouse asks: 'Without understanding why, what was the point of knowing who?' Discuss. How well do you understand the killer's motive?
